There are also 5 Key Competencies in the New Zealand Curriculum, attributes and skills that students will need to succeed in life:


- Thinking

These competencies are woven into the eight learning areas with opportunities for students to learn about and practice them in an authentic context.

This year we have goals set at the very early level of the Curriculum for supported learners with special educational needs. Goals for all students will be developed in 2023.


Literacy and Numeracy are important foundation skills for children.

Primary and intermediate schools focus on these because your child needs to have sound Reading, Writing and Maths skills to be able to do well in every area of learning at school and in life.

Teachers use many different ways to find out where your child is at. This includes a range of formal tests and assessments, watching your child working in the classroom, talking with your child about their learning and having your child assess their own and other's work.

Children do not all learn at the same pace. The New Zealand Curriculum is designed in levels which students move through as and when they are ready.


This diagram shows how the levels typically relate to years at school.

Our curriculum is not designed to fit a year group but rather for a child to progress as they achieve.






Understanding The Data










The curriculum level your child is expected to be workingwithin based on their school year level.

You will see posts in Reading, Writing and Maths that shows evidence of your child working towards, or having achieved a goal.

From Term 3 onwards this will be in real time and you can expect to see 2-3 posts each term.

You can engage with these posts by making comments.



Key Competencies

Your child will be supported to write reflections about their learning in the Key Competencies twice a year (termly for Whānau Wai students) and these will be posted onto their student profile.

We want to help your child to become a capable and lifelong learner. The aim of the key competencies is to give your child the skills to learn in any situation. Their written reflections will give parents an insight into how their child is developing with these capabilities.

How Can You Support Your Child?



- Ensure that you have easy access to Hero either by app or through the web
- Celebrate progress, the accomplishment of goals and talk with your child about their written reflections
- Talk to your child's teacher if you have any questions or would like some specific ways that you can help at home


